

the [REDACTED] Mr. X may have been Liddy. These stories refer to a very good friend of
Hunt's as Mr. X and otherwise identify only the arrested 5. Liddy is a conspicuous 7th.
As early as 7/10 Liddy had four (unnamed) lawyers. He did not get himself out of represent-
ing these suspects so far as the court records show until 8/4, which is after he was
deposed in the civil suit. However, it is my recollection that he had Rafferty in on the
actual representation the first plus continuing days, not only in the initial emergency.
More, unless my recollection is wrong, Caddy didn't even sit with defense counsel after
that initial appearance. Or, his client-counsel ploy was obviously fictitious. However,
there is language in the Star's 8/5 story that can dispute the above conjecture: "Caddy,
who also claims to represent Liddy..." If who Mr. X is is not certain, I'd like to devil's
advocate our earlier suspicions on this based on what we have since learned about Caddy:
Would any important person have permitted his fate in any criminal proceeding to have
rested in Caddy's hands? However answered, it does not address the possibility that Caddy
was faking just not to answer questions. One of those not answered, according to the Star,
was whether he had met Hunt close to the Watergate Bldg, not Mr. X, 7/11 story. HW 12/14/73
