Howard Hunt Jr., indicted last Friday along with the five other men in connection with the break in at Democratic National Headquarters in the Watergate Office Building. In addition, the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, Nixon campaign fichairman Maurice Stans, and former committee treasurer Hugh W. Sloan Jr. are named as defendants. The suit asks \$3.2 million in dam-

The Democrats responded yesterday by filing a notice of the criminal investigation that they intend to appeal Richey's ruling to the U.S. Court of Appeals. Preparations were being made late yesterday to try to have the appellate court hear the Democrats' appeal by the end of the week.

Joseph A. Califano Jr., one of the Democrats' lawyers, said the appeal was being made because the five original defendants "are clearly, in our judgment, responsible" and because they are "appropriate defendants." The five defendants are James W. McCord. Bernard L. Barker, Virgilio R. Gonzales, Eugenio R. Martinez and Frank R. Sturgis. All five were arrested inside the Democrat's Watergate headquarters June 17.

Richey dismissed the original suit on the grounds that the Democrats failed to meet a deadline for opposing a motion by the five defendants for dismissal. At the same time,

Richey gave Liddy and Hunt 20 days in which to respond to the amended suit, making it more difficult for the case to come to trial before the Nov. 7 general election. Richey reiterated yesterday that he is "anxious to have these cases brought to trial at the earliest,

Richey scheduled a pre-trial conference, closed to the public, for this morning. He plans to discuss with all lawyers involved questions he raised in his stated effort to expedite the Democrats' suit and two counter suits filed by Stans.

The Democrats filed a request yesterday with Richey that a representative of the Attorney General be quested to attend the conference. The Democrats' motion said they would like the Attorney General to provide "physical and documentary evidence in his possession" as a result of the Watergate break-in. To expedite the trial and bring full disclosure of the facts, lawyers for the Democrats said, "the Attorney General's Iron Curtain of secrecy must be lifted."
