Democrats Reject GOP Proposal

Democrats suing the Nixon re-election committee for \$6.4 million in the Watergate break-in and bugging have rejected a new offer to settle for \$600,000, but have indicated any figure. Since then, they they are willing to make a deal for about twice as much. made no additional offer.


