Segretti, Kline Talk About

Joel Kline, the one time "boy wonder" stock manipulator who has admitted committing every white-collar crime except forgery, has expressed to friends an interest in conducting a study of political and governmental corruption.

Among those with whom Kline discussed his idea was a relatively new acquaintance, Donald H. Segretti, the "dirty trickster" of the 1972 Nixon presidential campaign, according to Kline's friends.

Segretti and Kline, both in their 30s, were inmates this spring at Ft. Holabird outside Baltimore where federal marshals have a "safe house" for important federal witnesses.

There is no indication that Kline hoped to enlist Segretti in the anti-corruption project. Although people with whom Kline has discussed the matter say he sounded serious, some say he has finally decided against the project.

One friend said he sensed a new "Ralph Nader-type" instinct in Kline. "He seemed to be searching for an outlet," said another associate who has talked with Kline since his release from confinement in March.

Kline was a key government witness in the corruption trial of Baltimore County Executive Dale Anderson. He is currently providing information to both state and federal prosecutors for their continuing investigation of Maryland political corruption.

Kline, 34, began serving a six-month sentence in early November after pleading guilty to one count of obstruction of justice in connection with Securities and Exchange Commission investigation.

Before his conviction, Kline had been regarded as an extraordinarily skilled businessman. By finesse and charm he had accumulated a fortune from land speculation, phony corporations and stock manipulation. He is currently the center of a \$5 million bankruptcy proceeding:

None of Kline's friends who spoke with The Washington Post wanted to be named.

There were several versions of just what Kline had in mind for his project.
