

LIDDY, M'CORD ASK RELEASE ON BOND

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (UPI)

—G. Gordon Liddy and James W. McCord Jr. asked today to be freed from jail on bond pending sentencing on their convictions in the break-in and bugging of the Democratic National Headquarters.

The requests for bond were filed with the United States District Court by attorneys for the two men. The motions asked that bond be set at \$40,000 for McCord and \$10,000 for Liddy, the same amounts required during the 16-day trial.

Chief Judge John J. Sirica ordered McCord and Liddy jailed without bond immediately following their convictions yesterday. The jury had deliberated only 90 minutes before finding them guilty on all charges.

Five other men had pleaded guilty earlier.

McCord, a former C.I.A. and F.B.I. operative was chief of security for Mr. Nixon's reelection committee, and Liddy, a former White House aide, served as counsel to the Nixon committee's finance arm.

They were charged with burglary, conspiracy and illegal wiretapping. McCord was found guilty of eight counts and could receive up to 45 years in prison and \$60,000 in fines. Liddy was convicted of six counts and could receive 35 years and \$40,000 in fines.

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
