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Plea for Federal Lawyers in Bugging Case Is Dropped

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (Reuters)—The Administration today dropped its demand that Justice Department lawyers be allowed to represent White House aides subpoenaed to testify about the alleged bugging of the Democratic National Committee headquarters.

No reason was given for the withdrawal of the department's appeal of a Federal judge's ruling against the request.

It means that Charles Colson, special counsel to the President, and Alfred Wong, a Secret Service expert on electronic devices, will have to be represented by private lawyers.

The Democrats have filed a \$1-million civil suit against the Committee for the Re-election of the President and five men alleged to have been found in the Democratic committee headquarters with electronic bugging devices.
