

Osteopath Who Treats Nixon Indicted on Taxes

NEW YORK, April 10 (AP) —A federal grand jury today indicted a physician-osteopath, who treats President Nixon and other notables, on charges of evading taxes on \$82,000 in income during the years 1966-70.

Federal officials said that Dr. W. Kenneth Riland, 61, of Manhattan, is to plead in Manhattan federal court April 23 to a five-count indictment.

Asst. U.S. Attorney David M. Brodsky said that the grand jury alleged that Riland knowingly failed to pay more than \$39,000 in taxes due on unreported income totaling \$82,000 he received in medical fees from patients.

If convicted, Riland could get five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine on each count.

At the White House, it was reported that Riland has treated Nixon, presidential aide Henry A. Kissinger and a White House personal secretary, Rose Woods.

A White House spokesman confirmed that Riland had accompanied Nixon on the China trip. The spokesman said the President paid Riland out of his own pocket for the treatments, but he did not know how much.
