NEW YORK, July 28 — Vice President Spiro Agnew and others in White House circles are secretly discussing the repeal of the Bill of Rights and cancellation of the 1972 elections, according to a confidential memorandum from the Vice President's office published in the August issue of *Scanlon's Monthly*, on the new way.

Reproduction of the Daily World front page of July 29, 1970 includes a photostat of a memorandum reportedly issued from the office of Vice President Spiro Agnew calling for a study of means to avoid holding the 1972 elections. The issue was brought up again, allegedly in jocular fashion, at a Christmas Eve 1970 party in Washington by Richard G. Kleindienst, President Nixon's nominee for Attorney General to succeed John Mitchell.
