# Burglary Trial Of Ehrlichman Put Off to April

LOS ANGELES, John Ehrlichman, David Young, and G. Gordon Liddy, charged with the 1971 burglary of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist's office, will stand trial here next April 15.

Liddy and Young face one to 15 years of prison on burglary and conspiracy charges. Ehrlichman is also charged with perjury, and faces one to 14 years.

Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Gordon Ringer set Dec. 26, Jan. 14, Jan. 29, and Feb. 25, as dates for the hearing of pre-trial motions.

These motions include those of selective prosecution, pre-trial publicity, and the defense requests to learn more about the prose-

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... cution's case through the discovery procedures.

Another reason for the continuance of the trial, which had been scheduled to begin yesterday, was the unavailability of former White House Aide Egil Krogh, Jr., who headed the so-called plumbers unit.

Krogh pleaded guilty in Washington on Nov. 30 to one federal charge of violating the civil rights of Ellsberg's psychiatrist, Dr. Lewis Fielding. When Krogh pleaded guilty in Washington, the local charges against him here were dropped.

Trott told the court that Krogh would not talk until after he has been sentenced by U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gesell next month.

Joseph Ball, Ehrlichman's chief defense attorney, said his selective prosecution motion was based on what he called the fact that no police officer has been prosecuted here "in 18 years for breaking down doors," and that since Ehrlichman and the others were federal officers, acting under orders, they should not be prosecuted.
