

'Federal Memos'

A New Find at Nixon Committee

Watergate investigators have discovered internal memorandums from a number of federal regulatory agencies in the files of the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, according to sources close to the investigation.

They said the memorandums contained information about enforcement and rate cases involving large corporations. Such cases are considered critical to the profit potential of companies in many industries.

The alleged presence of the memorandums in the files is considered important, because it has been widely reported that campaign officials collecting money from large corporations paid particular attention to those with regulatory problems.

Furthermore, some of the companies that have admit-

ted making illegal contributions to the President's 1972 re-election campaign said they did so under severe pressure.

Memorandums from such agencies as the International Revenue Service, the Securities and Exchange Commission and the Civil Aeronautics Board were found in the files of the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, the sources said.

The files had been turned over to the National Archives by the campaign committee, but were later subpoenaed by the Watergate grand jury and the Senate Select Committee on Presidential Campaign Activities.

David M. Dorsen, assistant chief counsel of the Senate committee, declined to comment on the reports.
