

Wyman Role Alleged in Farkas Post

CONCORD, N.H., Sept. 3

(UPI)—Democratic Senate candidate Laurence Radway today filed a formal complaint with the House of Representatives alleging that his Republican rival, Rep. Louis C. Wyman, was involved in the sale of an ambassadorship.

Radway said it appeared to him that Wyman misled the Senate Foreign Relations Committee about what happened in the sequence of events leading to the appointment and confirmation of Ruth Farkas of New York as ambassador to Luxembourg.

Radway accused Wyman of misleading the committee by saying Mrs. Farkas was cleared by the State and Justice departments and by Luxembourg before she met with former President Nixon's campaign finance chairman Maurice H. Stans to discuss a contribution of \$300,000.

He said testimony by former presidential lawyer Herbert W. Kalmbach showed that Kalmbach had been in touch with Wyman in 1971 about Mrs. Farkas wanting an ambassadorship and her willingness to contribute \$250,000 to the re-election campaign.

Radway said in his affidavit of complaint he believed there were grounds to investigate whether Wyman violated the law.
