MEMO RE E. HOWARD HUNT

I was at the Penn library today and did the research you requested re Hunt. I checked the Who's Who for 1960-1969 (5 volumes). I enclose a copy of his entry in the 1968-69 edition. The entry is the same in each addition with the following changes: For 1962-63 his address is 2314 Tracy Place NW, Washington 8. He is then listed as having written 24 novels. For 1964-65 his home address is listed as 5029 Millwood Lane NW, Washington 16. This is the first time he gives his office address as Littauer and Wilkinson. For 1966-67, his home address is "Madrid, Spain" and the listing says "36 novels."

I was not able to obtain any back issues of the New York telephone directory.

I checked the Union Catalogue listing of authors in print starting with 1942, when Hunt's first book was published. I did not find 42 books, as he claims. Here is a list of the books by him I found (Incidentally, all are listed under Hunt. Where he wrote under an alias, that is indicated, and the name listing under each alias directs the reader to his real name, Hunt, Howard.)
