

Police Hunt Four Others in Break-In At Democratic

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Washington—Authorities are searching for four men who rented rooms at the Watergate Hotel here along with four other men charged with Sat-

urday's break-in into the Democratic National Committee headquarters, it was disclosed.

The four were linked with the accused, a Metropolitan police official said, by hotel records indicating that all eight are connected with an organization called "Ameritas."

"Ameritas" is the name of a Florida real estate development corporation formed in April, 1969, and it was learn-

ed last night that its letterhead was used in making reservations at the Watergate.

Connection Denied

But the principal officer of the corporation, Miguel R. Suarez, said later in a telephone interview, that none of the men had interests in "Ameritas" and that the letterhead had been used without his authorization.

Inspector Ernest Prete, head of the Criminal Investigations division of the Wash-

ington police, would not identify the four being sought. He said they stayed at the Watergate the weekend of May 26-29.

Prete said he was uncertain whether they had used aliases in registering. One gave an address in Kansas City, two in New York and one in Miami, and one used a Spanish surname, he added.

Inquiry Ordered

The Federal Bureau of Investigation is reportedly

searching for the four.

Meanwhile, it was learned from Republican sources that John N. Mitchell, chairman of the Nixon reelection campaign, had ordered an inquiry of his own to determine if any relationship existed between the raiders and the Nixon organization.

Prete and other sources confirmed that four of the five arrested at gunpoint inside the Democratic Party offices also stayed at the hotel on the

May 26-29 weekend.

They are Bernard L. Barker, Eugenio R. Martinez, Frank Sturgis and Virgilio R. Gonzales. The fifth man arrested then, James W. McCord Jr., resides in the Washington area.

All five are said to have had relationships with the Central Intelligence Agency. McCord was discovered to be a security consultant for the Committee to Reelect the President.

[The Miami News reported that two of the men, Martinez and Sturgis, also known as Fiorini, were registered as Democrats. The paper also said that voter registration records in Miami showed that Barker and Gonzales were re-registered as Republicans.]

The police said the men had in their possession electronic bugging and eavesdropping equipment and cameras.
