OKLAHOMA CITY, March 12-U.S. Attorney William R. Burkett won an indefinite stay today from his disbarment for alleged misconduct in Democratic Gov. David Hall's income tax suit against the federal government.

A stay order was issued by the Tenth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver less than 18 hours after U.S. District Court Judge Stephen S. Chandler here disbarred Burkett and five other government attorneys from practice in the western district of Oklahoma.

The stay allowed Burkett and his assistants to proceed with a hearing involving criminal conspiracy charges against state Treasurer Leo Winters.
