"The subcommittee has decided, with the concurrence of the White House, to postpone the President's appearance until Thursday, October 17 at 10 a.m. to afford ample time for selection and sequestration of the Watergate jury. As chairman of the subcommittee, I believe any further comment would be inappropriate at this time."

Hungate's only further statement was that he talked by telephone with someone at U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica's court shortly before 6 p.m. and was told they jury selection had not been completed.

The Judiciary subcommittee agreed, with only Rep. Wiley Mayne (R-Iowa) dissenting, that the hearing should be delayed until a jury has been selected and locked up out of reach of newspapers and television, because the testimony might prejudice the right of defendants to a fair trial.
