

Dektor Counterintelligence & Security, Inc., the firm used by Rhine to attack the report of the tape experts (WxPost 2/2/74) sounds like a detective agency rather than electronics experts and also sounds familiar in a way I cannot place. However, the name of the "head" of the firm, Allan D. Bell, Jr., does not seem familiar.
