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## Antiwar Unit Accuses U.S. Of Break-In

NEW YORK, July 2 (UPI) —The War Resisters League accused the federal government today of breaking into its New York offices in 1969.

Leaders of the league, which organized antiwar protests in the 1960s, admitted they had no hard evidence but based their charge on "intimation."

The league offices were broken into and ransacked on May 9, 1969. The league said mailing lists and stencils were stolen.

"At the time we thought it was the work of some right-wing extremist group," league chairwoman Irma Zigas said. "However, in light of the disclosures of the illegal raids ordered by the White House we have good reason to suspect the government was behind the raid."

She said that, after the 1969 break-in, FBI agents were ordered to watch the activities of the league, which at the time was organizing the moratorium demonstrations held in October, 1969.

She said the league found out about the FBI surveillance from documents that were stolen from FBI offices in Media, Pa., in March, 1972 and anonymously sent to the news media.
