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'PLOT' JURY HEARS 3 GIVEN IMMUNITY

2 Librarians and Technician Called in Kissinger Case

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Three witnesses testified today before the Federal grand jury that has indicted six persons in an alleged plot to bomb Washington heating tunnels and kidnap Henry A. Kissinger, the Presidential adviser.

Yesterday, Sister Jogues Egan, 52 years old, a Roman Catholic nun, the former president of Marymount Manhattan College in New York, was jailed on contempt charges for refusing to testify before the grand jury despite a grant of immunity.

The three witnesses called today were Miss Patricia Rom, 27 years old, and Mrs. Zoya Horne, both librarians at Bucknell University, and Joseph M. Joynt, 35, an elevator technician for the General Services Administration. They testified under a grant of immunity after a hearing before Federal District Judge R. Dixon Herman.

Indictments Cited

Miss Rom testified this morning. Her attorney, Thomas Mennaker, said the questions pertained to acts alleged in the conspiracy indictments returned Jan. 12 against the Rev. Philip F. Berrigan, the Rev. Joseph R. Wenderoth and the Rev. Neil R. McLaughlin — all Catholic priests — Anthony Scoblick, a former priest, Sister Elizabeth McAlister, a nun, and Eqbal Ahmad, a Pakistani citizen a fellow of the Adlai Stevenson In-

stitute for International Affairs, University of Chicago.

Mr. Joynt testified for nearly two hours in the afternoon, emerging only once to speak to his lawyer. He said that he had answered all questions.

Mrs. Horne testified in the late afternoon and is to be recalled tomorrow morning. Mr. Mennaker said she was asked, among other things, about an alleged plan to destroy draft records in New Haven.

Meanwhile, Francis X. Gallagher, attorney for the Catholic Diocese of Baltimore, filed court papers seeking to quash a grand jury subpoena for the Rev. J. William Michelman.

Mr. Gallagher contended that the subpoena for the Jesuit priest, who had testified as a character witness at a bail reduction hearing for three of the indicted, was "a vehicle for a fishing expedition, which expedition carries with it a correlative quality of intimidation."

Former Nun Paroled

ALDERSON, W. Va., Jan. 27 (AP)—Marjorie Melville, a former nun who along with the Revs. Philip and Daniel Berrigan and six others was convicted in 1968 of destroying draft records in Catonsville, Md., was released on parole from a women's penitentiary here today.
