Prisoners in A Hunger Strike Moved

Five federal prison inmates were transferred to the prison hospital over the weekend as they continued a hunger strike in support of imprisoned antiwar priests Philip and Daniel Berrigan.

Paul Wilkes, duty officer at the Federal Correctional Institute, said yesterday the five were transferred to the hospital as a precaution.

They began refusing solid food Friday.

The Revs. Philip and Daniel Berrigan, serving sentences for destroying draft records in Catonsville, Md., were refused parole late last month.

The five hunger strikers are drinking milk, tea, coffee and other liquids served with meals, Wilkes said.

"They are being served regular meals, just like everyone else, but they are refusing to eat," Wilkes said.

He would not name the hunger strikers nor confirm reports that one was Ted Glick, one of eight persons, including the Rev. Philip Berrigan, indicted in an alleged plot to kidnap presidential adviser Henry Kissinger.

Neither Berrigan brother is involved in the hunger strike, Wilkes said. *Associated Press*
