REV. PHILIP BERRIGAN AND 25 ARE ISOLATED

DANBURY, Conn., Aug. 9 (AP)—The Rev. Philip Berrigan and 25 other inmates of the Federal prison here were placed in an isolated cellblock today after Father Berrigan and five other inmates passed out leaflets urging the prisoners to take part in a hunger and work strike to support all "political prisoners."

John J. Norton, warden of the prison, said the leaflets were printed on a prison mimeograph machine.

He said the six were joined later in "administrative segregation" by 20 other inmates who participated in a work strike.

The inmates were placed in individual cells in a separate housing unit and not allowed to mingle with the other prisoners, Mr. Norton said. More than 100 people gathered at the entrance to the prison today for a rally in support of Father Berrigan and his brother, the Rev. Daniel Berrigan, and all other "political prisoners."

The Berrigan brothers are serving sentences for destroying draft records in Catonsville, Md. They were denied parole last month.

David Dellinger, one of the Chicago 7 defendants, spoke at today's rally and called for a major demonstration here on Oct. 3 for the release of "political prisoners" and the withdrawal of American armed forces from Indochina.
