New Raid Plots Told

Harrisburg, Pa.

Federal attorneys said yesterday they had uncovered plans by antiwar activists to raid Government offices in nine States during their investigations of an alleged plot to kidnap presidential adviser Henry A. Kissinger.

The attorneys made their disclosure in a court brief filed in the case of The Rev. Philip Berrigan, an imprisoned Roman Catholic priest, and seven other persons. All were indicted on charges of conspiring to kidnap Kissin-

ger, blow up the heating systems of five government buildings, and raid draft boards.

The court brief details the role in the alleged conspiracy of Boyd F. Douglas, 30, accused by defendants of being a government informer. Douglas was a prisoner with Berrigan in the Lewisburg, Pa., federal penitentiary.

Government lawyers yesterday said the defendants plotted to raid selective service officers in Rochester, N.Y.; New Haven, Conn.; Dover, N.J., Philadelphia and

three communities in Delaware.

The document named 41 persons in addition to the eight defendants who attended meetings where the raids were discussed. They included John Peter Grady, 46, alleged ringleader of a raid on

the Camden, N.J., draft board offices broken up by FBI agents, and other persons charged in that raid.

The brief, filed in answer to defendants' requests for a "bill of particulars" of the charges against them, indicated the government would concentrate on proving the defendants conspired to destroy draft records, rather than the alleged kidnap plot.
