

**TRIAL OF BERRIGAN
IS AGAIN POSTPONED**

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 11 (AP)—The trial of the Rev. Philip F. Berrigan and seven other anti-war defendants in an alleged plot to kidnap Henry A. Kissinger, assistant to President Nixon, was postponed today for another week, until Jan. 24.

United States District Judge R. Dixon Herman pushed back the trial's opening to consider defense motions for a change of venue to New York and to inspect questionnaires of excused jurors. He said that 737 of 2,200 prospective jurors had been found not qualified.

The judge also asked Government and defense attorneys to submit to him questions that they wished him to ask the jury panel when the trial got under way.

He has summoned 175 men and women as potential jurors. Court attachés expect the selection of a jury to take at least two weeks.

United States Attorney S. John Cottone attributed the new delay to the defense, but Leonard Boudin, a Harvard Uni-

versity law professor who is one of the seven defense attorneys, disagreed.

Lawyers went before Judge Herman this morning to argue a defense motion to move the trial out of Harrisburg.
