

Surviving CIA Surveillance

Singer Eartha Kitt is peeved at the news that the CIA had her under surveillance because she made critical remarks about the American presence in Vietnam during a 1968 White House luncheon.

"This is too much," Miss Kitt said in a Los Angeles Times interview. "This is

more than I can or will take. I am determined to do my part in stopping the gradual erosion of American freedom."

Miss Kitt said her White House outburst had made her life miserable in subsequent years, the cancellation of scheduled appearances in this country forcing

her to work mainly abroad. Yet, she said, she doesn't regret sounding off. "I have suffered a lot financially," said the 46-year-old singer, "but I have survived."

Zeppelin Shot Down

Boston will not be one of the cities to host a Led Zeppelin concert. Mayor Kevin H. White has refused to issue a license for the British rock group's scheduled Feb. 4 concert at Boston Garden. When tickets went on sale last Tuesday, 2,500 fans went on a rampage, waiting in line — smashing bottles, slashing tires, emptying fire extinguishers. So the Mayor has canceled the Led Zeppelin concert at the Garden. The city is an urban area with a population of 600,000, and all tickets were sold. For a 6-foot-tall singer, a tear of rage is a sight to be seen.
