David Belin, executive director of the Rockefeller commission, said yesterday that neither the CIA nor anyone except Lee Harvey Oswald was involved in the assassination of President Kennedy.

Belin, who was a counsel to the Warren Commission which investigated the Kennedy murder, said in an interview that charges there was more than one assassin were cases of "invisible gunmen shooting invisible bullets.

"There is no hard evidence that has come to my attention that in any way diminishes the veracity of the conclusion that Lee Harvey Oswald was the assassin and the sole assassin of President Kennedy," Belin said.

Belin leads the staff of 20 on the commission headed by Vice President Nelson Rockefeller which was named by President Ford to investigate charges of illegal domestic spying by the Central Intelligence Agency.

Comedian and political activist Dick Gregory met with

the commission early this month to present what he called new evidence that there were multiple assassins and that the CIA was involved.

Gregory based his contention largely on a copy on an amateur movie taken during the shooting of Kennedy. He said the film proves that Kennedy was shot from in front, not from the back by Oswald as concluded by the Warren Commission.

"We (the Warren Commission) had the original of that film, and it was clearer than Gregory's copy," Belin said. "We made 35 millimeter slides of every frame of the movie, and I'm afraid I don't agree with his conclusions."

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
