C.I.A. PANEL GIVEN
2-MONTH EXTENSION

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—President Ford has ordered a two-month extension of the Rockefeller Commission's investigation of alleged domestic wrongdoing by the Central Intelligence Agency, Vice President Rockefeller announced Monday.

The commission's new deadline of June 6 "is one that will be met," said Mr. Rockefeller, chairman of the panel.

The executive order, signed Saturday, extended the original deadline of April 4. It also said the panel's mandate to investigate only domestic wrongdoing had not been changed. But past statements by Mr. Rockefeller and other officials made it clear that the extension was at least partly linked to allegations of C.I.A. involvement in foreign assassination plots.

The eight-member panel was established by Mr. Ford in January in response to allegations that the C.I.A. had conducted a massive illegal domestic spy operation against Viet-

nam war dissidents.

In its 12th weekly session today, the commission heard from academic experts in the field of individual privacy apparently in an effort to draft recommendations on preventing future domestic wrongdoing by the agency.

"It can't be done within the C.I.A.," Prof. William Van Alstyne of Duke University told reporters. "You've got to have a monitor fully detached from the agency."

However, he added that regulatory bodies had a history of becoming captives of the agencies they were created to regulate.

Prof. Edward J. Bloustein, president of Rutgers University, said the scholars had agreed on the need for a public code of ethics governing intelligence gathering.
