

Probe Won't Cover JFK Death--Rocky

Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller ruled out the possibility yesterday that the presidential panel probing Central Intelligence Agency domestic activities will reopen the Warren Commission's investigation into the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

"That would be entirely outside of our problems," the vice president said when asked to comment on a recent statement by President Ford that "the Rockefeller Commission may, if the facts seem to justify it, take a look at" the Warren Commission findings that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone in the assassination.

Rockefeller acknowledged the previously reported fact that the commission was "taking a look to see if there was any possible connection" of the CIA to the assassination.

However, David W. Belin, staff director of the eight-member commission, has said previously that the panel has seen "no credible evidence" linking the agency to the Kennedy killing.

The commission held its 13th weekly session yesterday, questioning McGeorge Bundy, former national security adviser to Presidents Kennedy and Johnson.
