

## Bad Effects Of CIA Drug Tests Told

CIA and Department of Defense testing of behavior influencing drugs has resulted in death, epilepsy and periods of extreme depression and anxiety for persons subjected to the experimentation, a Senate subcommittee was told yesterday.

Mary Ray told the Senate judiciary subcommittee that she had been reduced to "a state of absolute terror" after she was injected with LSD as part of experiments conducted under an Air Force contract at the University of Minnesota Psychiatric Hospital in the mid-1960s.

Elizabeth Barrett told how her father had died in 1953 after receiving an overdose of a mescaline derivative as part of an Army-financed program at the New York State Psychiatric Institute.

She read portions of her father's medical record which she said indicated that the drug was "apparently forced upon him."

Alice Olson, widow of Dr. Frank Olson, who fell to his death in 1953 several days after being administered LSD by a CIA employee, retold her story of how she was never informed of the real cause of her husband's death until the Rockefeller Commission revealed the incident last June.

Retired Army Colonel William R. Jordan described a 1960 LSD experiment at Fort Benning, Ga., in which he and 33 other volunteers were warned ahead of time that they would experience "bizarre effects"

Afterward, he was checked by a medical officer, kept overnight and then released, Jordan said. However, he said he now suffers from epileptic seizures.
