# Rocky Urges Action On CIA Legislation

Washington

Vice President Nelson Rockefeller said yesterday Congress should stop investigating the intelligence agencies and start writing legislation to prevent abuses by the CIA and other organizations.

Rockefeller said his own White House committee investigation of the CIA had recommended legislation and said "now headlines are coming out in the papers that were in our reports."

Both the House and Senate are investigating domestic intelligence gathering.

"I don't think there is any useful purpose served by the continuation of the so-called, quote 'revelations,' unquote," Rockefeller said. "What they ought to do now is come up with the recommendations on what they feel is necessary."

"We've got to have an intelligence service. We don't want to give away so much information on how the system works that we

make it unworkable," Rockefeller said.

Rockefeller was interviewed on ABC-TV's "Issues and Answers."

On other issues, Rockefeller said:

- Senator Robert Mathias' statements last week that President Ford is pursuing conservative policies that jeopardize support among moderate Republicans is "speculation."

- He is not seeking or running for another term as vice president. Mr. Ford should have a free choice for a running mate if he wins the GOP nomination, Rockefeller said. *United Press*
