## JFK Friend 'A Family Girl'

Judith Campbell Exner, who said she had a "close personal" relationship with President John F. Kennedy, was a "quiet family kind of a girl," her former husband, actor William Campbell, said yesterday.

Campbell and the former Judith Immoor were married Oct. 25, 1952, when she was 18. They were divorced in 1958 and Campbell said he had completely lost contact with her.

He said he was never aware of her friendship with Kennedy, nor did he know that she had remarried.

"I only knew her as a very quiet, family kind of girl," he said. "She had two brothers and two sisters and her parents. She was a high school girl when I met her. It was a typical American home."

One sister was actress Susan

Morrow, who at one time was a contract player for Paramount Pictures and was briefly married to comedian Gary Morton. Morton is now married to Lucille Ball.

"She wasn't an outgoing person," Campbell said. "She was a bit introverted. She didn't have any deep convictions about anything at that time. If I was a Republican, she'd be a Republican. There were no causes that she espoused."

He said he heard through friends that after their divorce she dated, "just local fellows" and worked for a time as a secretary for comedian Jerry Lewis at Paramount.

He said their divorce was amicable and "we both took the position that we had both been too young." There were no children.

"I heard later that she tried to become an actress, but it just wasn't her thing," he said.
