

## **FOUR-DAY DELAY SET FOR PUEBLO INQUIRY**

CORONADO, Calif., Jan. 13—The Navy announced today that the court of inquiry into the capture of the intelligence ship Pueblo would be delayed from Thursday until Monday.

It was also announced that the investigation would cover three phases: the mission of the vessel, her seizure by North Korean gunboats and the detention of the crew.

"We will try to create a record and present a story that will unfold in an orderly fashion, something that will present a complete picture of what happened," Capt. William R. Newsome, the counsel for the five-admiral court, said at a news conference today.

The delay in the start of the public court of inquiry was requested by E. Miles Harvey, the civilian attorney for the key figure in the case, Comdr. Lloyd M. Mucher, the skipper of the 179-foot-long intelligence ship, which was seized last January.

Mr. Harvey had said that he needed more time with Commander Bucher, who has been undergoing extensive "debriefings" by civilian and military intelligence officials here.
