

JAVITS CRITICIZES SOME C.I.A. ROLES

Senator Jacob K. Javits, Republican of New York, said Sunday that "the real trouble" in the controversy over operations of the Central Intelligence Agency "is that things that should have been open were clandestine."

Mr. Javits said in an interview on the Columbia Broadcasting System's "Face the Nation" television program:

"There's no reason why we can't finance a student who wants to go to a foreign convention or a foreign meeting any more than there is any reason why we can't finance a Fulbright scholar who goes abroad to study.

"And that goes for trade unions or anyone else."

The danger, he said, is that "we allowed the C.I.A. to operate with lots of money secretly in his country, which was not their job."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—Senator J. W. Fulbright, Democrat of Arkansas, said Sunday that the intelligence agency should limit its activities to gathering information and leave operations to other branches of the Government.

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
