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Military in Chile Executes Two, Including a Former Governor

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SANTIAGO, Chile, Sept. 27—Two opponents of the military take-over in Chile were executed today on the order of military tribunals.

The former governor of Talca Province, Germán Castro Rojas, was executed at Talca, 150 miles south of here. He had been accused of assassinating a policeman and trying to sabotage a dam in the area.

Another "extremist," Teovaldo Saldiva Villalón, was executed at Quillota, 80 miles north of here. He had been arrested on Sept. 17 after attacking a post of carabineros, or paramilitary policemen.

More than 30 persons are to be brought before war tribunals in the port city of Valparaiso.

"We have to take a firm hand against all extremists," the Minister of the Interior, Gen. Oscar Bonilla, declared in an interview today, emphasizing the military government's concern that the left-wing part-

sans of the late President Allende Gossens would form an urban guerrilla movement.

General Bonilla said that calm had been restored to the country, with the exception of the Santiago area. He stressed, however, that all the left-wing political organizations were still "intact," and that most of their leaders were still free.

Meanwhile the leader of the right-wing Fatherland and Liberty movement, which had acted openly to overthrow the Allende regime, declared his full support of the junta.

Pablo Rodríguez Grez, who helped lead an unsuccessful uprising against President Allende on June 29, held a news conference here today to explain the role of Fatherland and Liberty in the events leading up to the military take-over two weeks ago.

"We are not an ultra-rightist movement but a nationalist movement making a nationalist revolution," Mr. Rodríguez declared. He said that Fatherland and Liberty had been dissolved as a movement and that its members were ready to support the military junta in the creation of "a broad progressive nationalist people's movement."

General Bonilla said that the military would clamp down on right-wing extremists as well as the left. However, the Fatherland and Liberty leaders gave their news conference in a downtown hotel without any interference from the authorities.

"What we are trying to avoid is a guerrilla war like that of the Tupamaros in Uruguay," General Bonilla declared.
