

Bitter U.N. Clash by Russ, Chile

United Nations

The Soviet Union and Chile clashed in violent exchanges in the General Assembly yesterday as Soviet Ambassador Yakov Malik charged that the military junta was about to execute Luis Corvalan, a Chilean Communist leader.

Other Soviet bloc delegates also rose to denounce the military government of Chile.

Chilean Ambassador Raul Bazan, taking the floor after Malik had interrupted general debate to denounce the "bloody terror" in Chile, denied that any execution was scheduled and accused Malik of "monstrous cynicism." Bazan said Corvalan was being held in prison but no charges had been brought and he would have to be tried before sentencing, let alone execution.

The Chilean said Malik was applying the standards of the Soviet Union "where life has never been sacred."

At a news conference later, the Chilean ambassador told newsmen that Corvalan probably will be tried under the military code on charges of training paramilitary forces and inciting the soldiers of the regular army to revolt, charges carrying a

possible death penalty. But he said any trial would be public, with international journalists permitted to attend.

Chilean Coup Toll

Santiago

The Chilean government said yesterday that 476 persons were shot to death in the coup that overthrew the Socialist government of President Salvador Allende and its aftermath, disrupting published reports putting the figure at 2500 or higher.

The Institute of Legal Medicine, a government agency whose function is similar to that of a coroner, said 462 civilians and 14 mil-

itary men or policemen had died of gunshot wounds over the past three weeks.

Last week a government spokesman said 284 persons had died in clashes.
