SANITAGO, Nov. 23-Final preparations began this week for the release of a group of Chile's political prisoners, announced two months ago and held up first by government hesitation then by differences with the relief agencies who must carry it out.

Despite lingering doubts over the extent and effect of the release program, church agencies early this week began the paperwork needed to take care of the first 100 prisoners nominated for exile by the military.

These prisoners, the first of a possible group of 500, ac-cording to sources involved in the program, were publicly named on Nov. 11, two months after Gen. Augusto Pinochet, chief of the Chilean junta, an-
