

**Deputy Intelligence Chief
For Bonn Commits Suicide**

BONN., Oct. 9 (AP)—The deputy chief of West Germany's secret Federal Intelligence Service, Maj. Gen. Horst Wendland, has committed suicide, Government sources said tonight.

Apparently because of the nature of the agency's work, the Government made no official announcement.

Authoritative sources said that General Wendland, 56 years old, had shot himself yesterday in his office near Munich. They declared that he had suffered from an "incurable depressive illness" and that his death was not connected with security matters.

General Wendland was born

in Berlin and entered the army in 1930. He had been a major general since 1963.

The Federal Intelligence Service, which is responsible directly to Chancellor Kurt Georg Kiesinger, is known to operate on a worldwide basis.
