Stennis's Doctors Fear an Infection; Prognosis Guarded

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WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (UPI)
—Surgeons said today that
Senator John C. Stennis,
wounded in a holdup last Tuesday night, was still in "very
serious" condition and they
were concerned about the possibility of infection.

Maj. Frank Garland, public
affairs officer for the Walter
Reed Army Medical Center, said
the prognosis for the 71-yearold Mississippi Democrat was
still "guarded."

Major Garland told a midafternoon briefing that Senator
Stennis, who was robbed and
shot twice in front of his home
in northwest Washington, was
resting well and "his vital signs
are good."

In response to questions,
Major Garland discussed the
possibility of infection. He said
that such a danger was always
present in injuries to vital organs.

"His surgeons are concerned

present in injuries to vital organs.

"His surgeons are concerned about the danger of infection from intestinal and pancreatic damage," Major Garland said. Asked when this danger period would end, he said that the surgeons "feel it is simply too early to make that determination."

The spokesman said that the Senator slept five to six hours last night and that he had not used a respirator since yesterday. He still had a slight fever and he was being fed intravenously.
