

'Forecast Kennedy Killing'

NEW YORK — (UPI) — A Cuban national who allegedly told Federal authorities President Kennedy would be murdered three days before his assassination is in Creedmore State Hospital in New York, it was learned today.

A copyrighted story in the Spanish-language daily newspaper El Tiempo said Tuesday Pascual Enrique Ruedo Gongora told the FBI on Nov. 19, 1963, Cuban Premier Fidel Castro had sent "six or eight teams" of assassins to the United States to kill Kennedy.

The story said Gongora, 45, told authorities Castro decided to do away with Kennedy before "Kennedy did away with him."

The article further said Gongora had been deported to Madrid and was assumed to be back in Cuba at present.

However, it was learned today that Gongora had written threatening letters to President Kennedy and then Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy and had been investigated by the Secret Service.

Subsequently, the Immigration Service questioned Gongora. He was found to be carrying several knives.

The Immigration Service did deport Gongora to Madrid, but Spanish authorities sent him back to the United States in February, 1964.

He was admitted to Creedmore Hospital in Queens later that month.
