LAWYER REINDICTED
IN KENNEDY INJURY

NEW ORLEANS, April 12
(AP)—Dean Andrews, a lawyer witness who once represented Lee Harvey Oswald on minor legal matters, was reindicted for perjury today by the Orleans Parish (County) grand jury.

The new indictment specifies five counts of perjury and cites about 2,000 words of his March 16 testimony before the grand jury.

Most of the testimony dealt iwth Mr. Andrews's encounter with a Clay Bertrand in 1963. He told the Warren Commission that "Bertrand" telephoned him after the assassination of President Kennedy asking that he represent Oswald.

District Attorney Jim Garrison contends that Clay Bertrand was an alias used by Clay

L. Shaw, 54 years old, the wealthy retired New Orleans executive charged with conspiring to murder President Kennedy.

The testimony cited in the reindictment quotes Mr. Andrews as saying in part:

I get the impression you all want me to identify Clay Shaw as Clay Bertrand. I'll be honest with you, that is the impression I get—

Q. Well?

A. And I can't. I can't say he is and I can't say he ain't. Sam Monk Zelden, Mr. Andrew's attorney, said last week he would ask for dismissal of the first perjury indictment on the ground that it did not specify the perjured testimony.
