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\$100,000 Damage Suit Filed Against Garrison

NEW ORLEANS, April 18 (UPI) — Dean A. Andrews Jr. filed a \$100,000 damage suit today against District Attorney Jim Garrison, who has obtained two perjury indictments against Mr. Andrews in his investigation of the assassination of President Kennedy.

In his suit, filed in United States District Court, Mr. Andrews, a lawyer, charged that Mr. Garrison brought him before the Orleans Parish County Grand Jury to testify despite the fact that Mr. Garrison knew that Mr. Andrews was not aware of any plot.

Mr. Andrews said that Mr. Garrison put him before the Grand Jury, "full knowing that the plaintiff [Andrews] had no knowledge of any conspiracy or any facts material to any conspiracy to murder John F. Kennedy."

He said Mr. Garrison "compelled me to answer questions designed to trap me."

Mr. Andrews earlier today entered a plea of not guilty to five counts of perjury, which were returned by the grand

jury last week. Sections of his testimony were believed to concern whether he has ever known a man named Clay L. Bertrand.

Mr. Garrison says Bertrand is an alias used by Clay L. Shaw, the New Orleans businessman accused of conspiring to assassinate the President.

After Mr. Andrews's arraignment today, Criminal District Judge Frank Shea granted a defense request for 10 days to file special pleadings.

Sam Zelden, Mr. Andrews's lawyer, said a motion to quash the indictment would be included in these pleadings. He also said the indictment did not say where perjury exists and added he would insist on getting all the testimony Mr. Andrews gave the Grand Jury.

Mr. Zelden also said his cli-

ent had never seen Clay Shaw in person. Mr. Shaw is the only person indicted so far in the case.

Mr. Andrews testified that he could not connect Mr. Shaw, the former managing director of the New Orleans trade mart, with Clem Bertrand, a man Mr. Andrews says phoned him after the assassination and asked him to represent Lee Harvey Oswald, the assassin.

Mr. Garrison maintains that Bertrand and Shaw are the same person. Mr. Garrison also says Mr. Shaw, Oswald and the late David W. Ferrie, conspired in September, 1963, to kill Kennedy.

Mr. Shaw is free on \$10,000 bond after being indicted for conspiracy to murder President Kennedy.

Gov. James A. Rhodes of Ohio confirmed today that he had received extradition papers from Louisiana for the return of Gordon Novel, former New Orleans tavern owner, who is wanted as a material witness by Mr. Garrison.
