

Garrison Men Cleared of Bribe Charges

Two investigators were cleared by police yesterday of trying to bribe a man into shoring up District Attorney Jim Garrison's Kennedy assassination probe.

Deputy police superintendent Presly Trosclair said Alvin Beauboeuf was offered money and a job in exchange for corroborative evidence, was sincerely believed he had — but that such offers were not unusual police procedure.

No bribe was intended, Trosclair said, and the police investigation showed no evidence to back Beauboeuf's claim that he was threatened if he disclosed the offer.
