NEW ORLEANS AP — Two television newsmen who investigated
the controversial Kennedy assassination probe stemed un Tuesday
to face charges filed by an irate Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison.
Walter Sheridan, 41, of Washington, an investigative reporter for
the National Broadcasting Co., surrendered at the criminal district
court clerk's office and posted $5,000 bond.
Before he left, Sheridan, charged with trying to bribe a Garrison
witness into changing his story, was subpoensed to appear before
the Orleans Parish grand jury Wednesday.
Richard Townley, a reporter for WDSU-TV in New Orleans, an
NBC affiliate, stood in criminal district court to plead innocent to
a similar bribery charge.
In another development, a new perjury charge was filed against
Dean A. Indrews Jr., a lawyer. He was accused, for the second
time, of lying to the grand jury assisting Garrison in the probe.
Sheridan Tlew here from Washington to surrender. I have not
violated any laws of this state, ') he said.
The charge, Sheridan added, is an effort by Garrison to use his
powers to intimidate the news media from taking a shertical look at
his case-which contends that a conspiracy to murder President
John F. Kennedy originated in New Orleans.
The President was assassinated in Dallas Nov. 22, 1962. The
efficial Warren Commission report said the killer was be Karvey
Oswald, a former New Orleans resident, and that he apparently
acted alone.
Beth Sheridan and Townley were charged after an NBC report on
June 19 examined Garrison's case against Clay L. Shaw in critical
detail and raised questions as to the ethics and procedures used
by Garrison and his investigators.
Garrison accused NBC of trying to wreck his case.
Shaw, 54, a wealthy retired businessman, is charged with conspiring
to murder President Kennedy. He pleaded innocent and remains
