

Garrison Testifies

Fireworks at Lawyer's Trial

New Orleans

Lawyer Dean Andrews Jr. took over his own defense in his perjury trial yesterday and called for District Attorney Jim Garrison and his entire staff to be removed from the case.

Andrews, who once represented Lee Harvey Oswald on legal matters in New Or-

leans, was the first man to go on trial in connection with Garrison's investigation into the assassination of President Kennedy.

He will be tried by a five-man jury in District Judge Frank Shea's court. The panel will probably be selected today.

Garrison took the stand last night and was questioned for 85 minutes by Andrews. It was the first time Garrison had taken the stand since launching his investigation into the assassination.

Andrews was indicted last March on charges of lying to the New Orleans grand jury about the identification of Clay Bertrand, a mysterious figure in Garrison's investigation.

Garrison testified he could not believe Andrews could not identify Bertrand as Clay Shaw, a New Orleans businessman charged with conspiracy in the death of President Kennedy.

Andrews filed a motion saying Garrison and his entire staff should be removed from the trial because Garrison had a personal interest in the case that conflicted with justice.

Andrews also filed motions for recesses, for a delay in the trial and for a mistrial. Judge Shea denied all motions and recessed the trial until today.
