SACRAMENTO AP - Gov. Reagan's office today received a request from Louisiana for the extradition of Edgar Eugene Bradley, charged with conspiring to murder the late President John F. Kennedy.

Edwin Meese III, Reagan's legal affairs secretary, forwarded the extradition papers to the office of Atty. Gen. Thomas C. Lynch for legal review - customary procedure in extradition cases.

When the papers have been approved as meeting legal requirements, the extradition hearing requested by Bradley's attorney will be scheduled.

Meese is expected to preside.

Bradley is the west coast business representative of Dr. Carl McIntire, a conservative radio evangelist. Bradley denies New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's charge that he had a part in the late president's assassination, and said he will resist attempts to extradite him to New Orleans.

The request for Bradley's return was signed by Louisiana Lt. Gov. C. C. Aycock.

Meanwhile in Los Angeles Bradley was granted a 60-day continuance of his Municipal Court hearing.

Judge Jean Dempsey Klein ordered Bradley to return to court March 29 for further proceedings.

Bradley's attorney, George Jensen, said if the extradition papers are approved as legal he will seek an extradition hearing in Sacramento.

Bradley, 49, of North Hollywood, has denied any special knowledge of the assassination. When he surrendered to the sheriff in December his attorney said he would "fight extradition tooth and nail."

Earlier this month judges refused to extradite two other Californians wanted by Garrison for testimony in New Orleans.

Loran E. Hall, 38, of Kernville and Lawrence J. Howard Jr., 38, of El Monte, were named by Garrison as witnesses needed in his assassination probe.
