S-I Incorrect In Shaw Trial Film Report

New Orleans attorney Ben C. Toledano said today that a proposal to Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. to film the trial of Clay L. Shaw was made by Public Broadcast Laboratory, a Ford Foundation grantee.

The States-Item incorrectly reported Saturday that the proposal was made by National Educational Television. Toledano is attorney for Public Broad-

cast Laboratory.

The attorney said PBL has of-fered to make an audio-visual transcript of the trial of Shaw, accused by District Attorney Jim Garrison of conspiring to kill President John F. Kenne-

dy.

PBL proposes that the transcript, if the court and attorneys approve, be made part of the official record of the trial. It would not be made public until final judgment in the case is

rendered.

Then, Toledano said, it might be used to produce a PBL docu-mentary for broadcast on NET stations. Cameras would be set up in a cloakroom adjoining the court, using an air-conditioning vent for filming, and tying in with microphones already in the court for sound.

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HIGH COURT REJECTS THIRD HOFFA APPEAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29—The Supreme Court declined today to review a third appeal brought by James R. Hoffa, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, to challenge his conviction for jury tampering.

Hoffa is serving an eight-year sentence at the Federal Penitentiary in Lewisburg, Pa. The appeal was based upon allegations that jurors, marshals and the trial judge, Federal District Judge Frank Wilson, were guilty of misconduct during the trial and prejudice toward Hoffa.

Hoffa's lawyers filed affi davits by four prostitutes from Chattanooga, Tenn., where the trial was held in 1964. They said they had been procured by the marshals to have sexual relations with some jurors during the trial. One of the women also said she had heard Judge Wilson say that Hoffa would get what was coming to him.

Two of the women have been convicted in perjury prosecutions growing out of these affidavits, and the one who made the statements about Judge Wilson has recanted her affidavit, according to the Government's brief.
