RIOTING IS TRAC TO KENNEDY DEATH

Mock Trial Is Told Slaying Triggered Overt Violence

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)

The assassingtion of President
John F. Kenned, was described
today by a student of agitation
and propagands as one of the
underlying causes of the urban
riofs of recent years.

Testifying at a three-day
mock trial of international communism sponsored by anti-Communist groups, Edward S. Butler
of New Orleans and Los Angeles
said the slaying had triggered
an appetite for overt violence
in many "revolutionaries."

"It smashed the highest symbol of authority in the country," he said. "Revolutionaries
all over the country looked up
and sdid, "We can get away
with shurder."

Mr. Butler, 33 years old, is
executive whe president of the
Information Council of the
Americas, which he described
as a private organization that
keeps tabs on propaganda and
agitation empaigns in the Western Hemisphere.

Although Mr. Butler said
various Communist parpases
had been served by the assas of
sination he did not attempt to
ascribe it to a Communist plot,
nor did be mention any Communist connection with the
riots in the cities.
