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JUDGE DENIES SHAW A CHANGE OF VENUE

NEW ORLEANS, April 4 (AP) —Clay L. Shaw must stand trial in New Orleans on charges of plotting to assassinate President Kennedy, a Criminal District Court judge ruled today in denying a change of venue.

Lawyers for Mr. Shaw, a prosperous businessman, immediately filed notice of a writ to the Louisiana Supreme Court for a review of the denial.

The refusal of Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. to move the trial at least 100 miles from here and the defense move toward the Supreme Court indicated that the trial could not be held before late May or June.

Judge Haggerty gave Mr. Shaw's lawyers 15 days in which to prepare an application to back their writ to the high court.

Mr. Shaw, 55 years old, former director of the International Trade Mart here, was not present in court.

His lawyers said they would

also ask the State Supreme Court to review Judge Haggerty's earlier refusal to reopen the change of venue hearing for what the defense called new evidence.

District Attorney Jim Garrison filed charges more than a year ago, accusing Mr. Shaw of conspiring with Lee Harvey Oswald and others to murder President Kennedy, who was assassinated in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963. Oswald was named by the Warren Commission as the lone assassin of President Kennedy.
