Publication Lists 11 More CIA Agents

An underground publication has named 11 more alleged CIA agents operating abroad, hoping to force them to leave their posts with their diplomatic cover "blown."

Covert Action Information Bulletin, in its January edition issued Thursday, said, "Once again, we are able to expose for our readers more CIA employes serving around the world under diplomatic cover, and to update the movements of several others already named in Dirty Work."

Dirty Work, a book co-authored by renegade CIA agent Philip Agee, last year listed more than 700 names of people it alleged were CIA or National Security Agency agents abroad.

A 12-year CIA veteran, Agee left the agency in 1969 to write books and articles about his former spy bosses and colleagues. Expelled from Britain, France and

several other western European countries, he is now believed to be living in Italy.

Agee, while in Havana last year at a communistsponsored festival, met with colleagues to launch the Covert Action Information Bulletin. It is published and edited in Washington and also distributed abroad.

The latest issue listed people identified as the CIA Chief of station in Islamabad, Pakistan two new "case officers" at the U.S. Consulate General in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; agents in Beirut and Cairo, and telecommunications experts in Manila and Athens.

Covert Action Information also listed the transfers of four CIA agents to new posts—naming alleged agents transferred from Athens to Manila; from Rome to Paris; from Paris to Rome and from Santiago to Paris.

The CIA, which described previous disclosures by Agee and Covert Action as "damaging," had no comment on the latest list.

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
