

# Warren probe defended

Washington, D.C. — UPI — The former counsel to the Warren Commission said Sunday the House Assassinations Committee is "plain wrong" in concluding there probably were two gunmen who took part in the murder of President John F. Kennedy.

David Belin said the panel's use of acoustical testimony to back the two gunman theory is like relying on a blind man to describe a scene.

"Any scientist can often mesmerize a lay person, a lawyer, and I'll say even a congressman and a senator," Belin said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

"The overwhelming evidence as a whole shows there was only one gunman," he said.

Belin defended the Warren Commission's finding that only Lee Harvey Oswald took part in the Nov. 22, 1963, assassination in Dallas.

He blamed the many conspiracy theories on the "deliberate misrepresentation" and "demagoguery" of assassination buffs.

Belin called for an FBI investigation of the committee's findings or an extension of the panel's work.
