WASHINGTON, Sept. 24-Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird said today that courtmartial charges against Lieut. Gen. John D. Lavelle were pending and "under current review" by the Air Force in connection with unauthorized strikes he had ordered in North Vietnam.

But Defense Department officials explained later that Mr. Laird was simply stating the present legal situation facing General Lavelle following formal charges of "criminal misconduct" filed against him last June by a junior Air Force

General Lavelle was relieved of his command, demoted from full general to lieutenant general and retired from the Air Force after investigations showed that he had falsified reports to justify unauthorized air strikes on North Vietnam as "protective reaction" raids—that is, in response to enemy threats on pilots.
