

New Move By Calley Defense

Counsel for Lieutenant William L. Calley Jr. requested yesterday that the Army be required to furnish full details on each of the 110 slayings of which he is accused.

They also asked that all duplicating specifications against Calley be dropped.

The motions were filed by Calley's civilian attorney, George Latimer of Salt Lake City, in a letter to Lieutenant Colonel Reid W. Kennedy, the trial judge.

Calley, 26, a native of Miami, Fla., faces a general court-martial on charges of slaying 109 civilians at the Vietnamese village of My Lai on March 16, 1968. He also is accused of slaying "one adult male" civilian about six weeks before the My Lai action.

In one of his latest motions, Latimer asked that the prosecution be required specifically to give names, times, places, dates and locations involved in each of the accusations. He also asked that the government spell out whether it will try to prove a single intent to kill all of the alleged victims or a specific intent with respect to each specification.

As an alternate to the second motion, which asked that "duplicious or multiplicitious" specifications be dropped, Latimer suggested that the government be ordered to designate the particular case upon which it will rely during the trial.

Calley's defense attorneys, Latimer and Army Major Kenneth A. Raby, have filed several previous motions including one that all charges against Calley be dropped on grounds that he is being held in the Army illegally. A hearing on those motions has been set January 20.

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
